

EASTER OPENS A NEW FUTURE

Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!

Like many of you, I've experienced resurrections big and small—moments when I was reminded that God is always bringing new life out of death, always snatching hope from the jaws of despair.

The good news on Easter Sunday is that God is still speaking and resurrection is indeed all around us. The spirit of the risen Christ is in

our midst even now. And what can we do, but run from this place, like Mary, to testify, "I have seen the Lord."

In times of great loss, we often need to *see* something. When the Malaysia Airlines flight 370 disappeared grieving family members demanded to see more evidence. Somehow *seeing* the debris -- or *finding* the black box -- promises closure for many people. For many of us, seeing brings closure to the cycle of confusion and loss. Or so we believe.

The truth is no one path accounts for the emergence of hope and new life. The Beloved Disciple can believe without seeing, a pattern that's highly valued in John's Gospel (1:50; 20:29). Mary needs a personal touch. She believes when Jesus calls her name (20:16-18). And Peter, having encountered the risen Jesus at least twice, has yet to fully believe.

Of one thing we can be certain. Those of us who have been touched by the resurrection will never be the same. Christ, as the apostle Paul says, is the first fruit of the resurrection in which we all participate. "Do not hold onto me", says Jesus, "I am ascending to my father and your father, my God and your God". What is mine, in other words, is yours as well. Let go of me, that God may grab hold of you.

The resurrection is not a return to the past, but a movement to the future. Neither Mary nor we nor our congregations can hold on to the past after resurrection. We look to the even greater future that God has in store for us through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Blessed, Happy Easter to everyone!

It is official! Pastor Kauffman was voted unanimously to move from Interim Pastor to part-time Pastor of LCOS. He will be with us till Pentecost 2026. Lord God, you loved this world so much, that you gave your one and only Son, that we might be called your children too. Lord, help us to live in the gladness and grace of Easter Sunday, everyday. Let us have hearts of thankfulness for your sacrifice. Let us have eyes that look upon your grace and rejoice in our salvation. Help us to walk in that mighty grace and tell your good news to the world. All for your glory, we pray, Lord, Amen.

Spring has arrived!! Easter has come and gone! Odd feeling when Easter is so early. Here it is April and no major holidays ahead until Thanksgiving! Yet it feels like we just rolled last Thanksgiving into Christmas and Christmas into Lent, into Easter.

Now we move into a new chapter at LCOS......our Interim Pastor Kauffman will be our regular Pastor. We warmly welcome Paster Kauffman! God had a plan for us, we just had to take the time to see and understand what it was. Financially, we were not in a position to hire a full time pastor and finding someone who could/would work with our needs would have kept a Call Committee busy for several years! The schedule Pastor and Council worked out benefits both.

But now is not the time to sit back, prop your feet up and have a glass of ice tea. Now is the time to work on LCOS. How do we grow? How do we let people know we are here for them? We need ideas and they need to come from you. Why are you here? What draws you to this location? Think of the people that have left: if you know a previous members in the area you might ask them why they left? Would they like to come back? Was there something we couldn't offer them? Any of these answers could be the answer we need.

As for projects....currently our efforts have been Luther Hall clean out, clean up, and organize. That building gets a lot of use, therefore always needs 'TLC'. With several on-going renters, and occasional events we seem to accumulate a lot of extra things. Gail has spent many hours going through the area under the stage, the room behind the stage, the activity room, and the attic. Those areas are almost finished.

I know many have expressed the desire to plant flowers in the courtyard/memorial garden, but plants need water and the well-pump died. However, Don found a new company to come out and take a look at our issue. While the fix is expensive, this company was a much better price, so the project has the green light to begin! Once we are back in operation, planting can begin. Sorry it was not before Easter, but we need to think about the flowering plants you plant. They need to be low-growing, not vines, and a plant that multiplies and blooms every year.

Next project is the roof on the Hall and the Food Bank. Both are very old and need replacing and that includes the underside of the walkway that has rotted away! This will be a very expensive project, but one that must be done before we have a bigger problem! I have three quotes to compare and a choice will be made. Then comes the cost and how we pay for this. This is like your home, multiplied by three or four.

And so it goes.....just like my house, issues never end!

- The Financial Report shows that 2024 started quietly. We ended the month with an income of about \$1,500. Kristi shared information about what a typical month looks like and details about designated funds.
- Pastor's Report: Pastor shared that we will need to have a separate meeting to vote on whether to call him for the next two years. With the new contract, he will take a few more Sundays off than he did this past year, but will ensure he will be here for all major services and has a plan in place for coverage as needed.
- Reports were shared regarding Kaye Prox Food Bank, Pastoral Care Team,
 Stewardship, and Facilities and Grounds.
- New Business:

The council voted to approve the contract drawn up by the council for Pastor Kauffman. We will have a special meeting for a congregational vote on March 17 with a representative from the synod present.

Kaye Prox Food Bank Update—Spring 2024

Ongoing:

We are 100% run by community volunteers, we host a drive-thru distribution each Friday at 2 pm, and we are a partner agency of Feeding Tampa Bay (FTB). FTB helps us in several ways:

- We place weekly online orders of (reduced-price or free) bulk dry goods, such as cereals, pasta, canned goods, as available. FTB delivers these items to us each Friday.
- We visit FTB's warehouse weekly to shop for bulk produce and refrigerated items, as available.
- We pick up directly from retailers who donate to FTB. We now do donation pickups at 4 stores, including 2 Walmart locations, 1 Publix, and 1 Aldi.
- Through in FTB's "Just in Time" program, we receive a pallet (or more) of produce, delivered each Friday. A surprise every week!

New & Exciting:

• After informally working together for a while, we have joined forces. The Little River Community Cupboard has become Kaye Prox Community Cupboard. The community cupboard is more of a pop-up distribution, with the goal of providing freshly donated food items to people in need, before the food can go to waste. We are delighted to have these dedicated volunteers join us! They have already hosted several Community Cupboards on the campus of LCOS. You can join the "Kaye Prox Community Cupboard" group on facebook, to see their current schedule. A photo from our first joint distribution (on the left):





- **New trailer** (photo on the right). We received a grant in late 2023 from Florida Medical's Foundation of Caring, toward the purchase of a new trailer. We are pleased to report that it is now in service! This 8x5 foot trailer is just big enough to hold 2 pallets of food, and just small enough that we can tow it behind an SUV.
- New 'LFPA' program this is a short-term opportunity. FTB has received funding from the USDA to purchase food directly from Florida producers, for the use of Florida food pantries. For the next 6 months or so, they'll be purchasing these bulk items, which we can pick up at the warehouse each Thursday. So far through the program, we have received dairy products, cabbage, corn, and ground beef, all fresh from Florida producers, to share with our clients.

LCOS Treasurer's Report

February Review:

Church **income** in February was **\$19,923**, in line with our budget of \$19,996 and above last year's result of \$17,899.

- Member Giving for February was \$14,822 vs. our budget of \$15,700 and member giving last year of \$14,335.
- We used designated funds of \$2,160 during the month. We applied \$2,000 from the Mortgage Reduction Fund toward early payment of principal. Memorial funds of \$160 were used for annual zoom account fees.
- Facilities/other income in February was \$2,942, vs. \$2,502 in the year-ago period.

Church expense was \$20,150 in February, vs. \$20,018 a year ago and our budget of \$19,916.

- We are up to date with our 2024 commitment to contribute at least \$250/month to the Florida-Bahamas Synod.
- Facilities expense for the month included \$1,602 in AC maintenance costs, as well as the additional \$2,000 toward mortgage principal pre-payment.
- All other expense categories were at or below expectations.

LCOS recorded a **net loss** of (**\$227**) in February.

LCOS 2024 New Priorities



In January 2024, Pastor Steve and Deacon Steve designed a questionnaire to help our Church Council evaluate our Mission Teams' performances in 2023 and to look forward to what **new** areas of mission LCOS might develop for 2024. Included in the questionnaire were mission teams we have used at LCOS and other churches have used where Pastor Steve has served. There were 15 mission team areas as described in the table below. This report focuses on the Council's thoughts on **new priorities for 2024** that would most closely follow our mission, vision, core values and what would most benefit God's work here at LCOS.

- **1. Administration** --includes telephone, office and email coverage, printing of bulletins, maintenance of membership lists, etc. with clear responsibilities for all
- **2.** Communication -includes website, Facebook, newsletter, sign, etc.
- **3.** Community Outreach -could include activities like Blessing of the Animals, Youth Groups, connection with Day Care Center, etc.
- **4. Religious Education** -includes Adult Bible Class, Confirmation Class, Children's Class, etc.
- **5. Evangelism** -could include door-to-door campaigns, (quarterly?) Bring a Friend Sundays, etc.
- **6. Facility & Property** -includes maintenance and long-range planning, rental planning, etc.
- **7. Fellowship** -includes LAFFS, special dinners, Fellowship Hour, Men's/Women's Groups?
- **8. Finance** -includes income/expense tracking, audits, budgeting, *Shepherd's Staff*, etc.
- 9. Food Bank
- -includes Portico Ministry and Friday Food Bank, etc.
- 10. Fun(d) Raising -includes Golf Tournament and other events TBD
- 11. Hospitality -includes Greeters, Card Ladies, new member sponsors, etc.
- **12.** Lay Pastoral Care -includes weekly calls/visits, call tree, maintenance of prayer lists, etc.
- **13. Stewardship** -includes yearly monetary stewardship drives, identification/deployment of congregational talents, etc.
- **14. Technology** -includes IT Advisory Group, electronic inventory, software approval and installation, software licenses, etc.
- 15. Worship & Music
- -includes bulletin content, AV Team, Altar Guild, Choir, ushers, liturgists, communion assistants, etc.

The results are shown in the following chart, where higher scores indicate the highest level of agreement among council members.



Based on these results, the Council decided to create three new Mission Teams and agreed to very rough draft mission statements:

Community Outreach -"...intentionally offer services to foster community connections ..."

Communication -"...let the community know who we are, what we do, and to share information in a timely, welcoming, and friendly Christian manner...

Evangelism -"...witness God's grace and love to those beyond LCOS..."

Pastor Steve, Deacon Steve, and Carol Cousins then met to develop a list of congregation members who would be great leaders for these three teams and designed a process where Deacon Steve and Carol Cousins who help new leaders to develop Mission team goals, choose others to serve on the teams and set 2024 goals and objectives.

Continuation of LCOS 2024 New Priorities)

I am pleased to report that Pastor Steve has contacted three congregation members and all three have agreed to serve! Deacon Steve will now contact these leaders to help them take their next steps in serving God's missions for us at LCOS.

This process of defining, creating, and delegating to Mission Teams will allow the Council to focus on more strategic efforts in 2024.
