On that first Easter Sunday Mary Magdalene and the other Mary visits Jesus' tomb. As they approach the tomb, there is an earthquake, and an angel rolls the stone away and sits on it!

"Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. ⁶He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the

place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him.' This is my message for you."

Even for those of us who can understand the women's circumstances should admit one indisputable fact. They, like all the others, believed death had won the day. They expected that Jesus would be tucked safely in the tomb, just where they left him three days ago. And you know, even among Jesus' followers today, this kind of thinking is all too common.

We expect Jesus to be where we last left him. We believe in a Jesus that fits into the narrow confines of a tomb, a Jesus that doesn't have a new word for our day, a Jesus who has stopped speaking.

My brother and I looked forward to an Easter basket hunt every year at sunrise. Before Easter Sunday worship, we would roll out of bed and follow "clues" which would lead us to our candy filled baskets. One year we looked and looked, only to find our baskets in the dryer and washing machine!

We were looking in all the wrong places!

That is true today. The women were looking for Jesus in all the wrong places. The resurrection of the dead, Easter, upsets and upends all expectations.

Jesus goes ahead of us, embracing us in good and bad times, promising he will be with us always.



We have 10 mission areas: Governance, Worship, Stewardship & Financial, Technology, Education, Outreach & Evangelism, Care, Property & Maintenance, Fellowship & Hospitality, and Social Media. Members of the council are serving as leads for each area, but we need to work together as a congregation to build up all these areas. Please consider joining a team that matches your interests and talents within one of these areas. Many hands make light work and we are more successful together than in isolation.

Treasurer's Report—March 2025 Submitted by Kristi Saligame

February Review:

Church **income** in February was **\$20,527**, below our budget of \$27,609 but ahead of last year's result of \$18,811.



- We used \$320 in Designated Funds (Fellowship Fund) in February. Our budget for the month included use of Designated Funds of \$9,000 for facilities repair/improvements.
- Facilities/other income in February was \$3,552, vs. \$2,942 in the year-ago period.

Church **expense** was **\$19,075** in February, vs. \$18,589 a year ago and our budget of \$31,242.

- In February, we set aside \$2,000 in funds toward future Pastoral Call/Compensation costs.
- Our budget for the month had included about \$12,000 in Facilities Maintenance expense; those projects will wait until a little later in the year.
- All other expense items were in line with expectations.

LCOS recorded a **net gain** of **\$1,452** in February.

Reflections:

Our Stewardship campaign took place in February, with a theme of "Sharing God's Blessings!". A huge "Thank you!" to the Stewardship team and to the households who pledged support for 2025. We received initial pledges of \$143,000 for the year, about the same amount that was pledged for 2024.

Regular membership giving represents about 60% of our budget, or \$198,101 of our 2025 Spending Plan of \$331,834. For perspective, total member giving to the General Fund in 2024 was \$193,033 (well above what was pledged).

Your gifts of time, talent, and resources are such a blessing! Please continue to keep the mission and ministries of this church in your prayers. Thank you for your ongoing, faithful support of the Lutheran Church of Our Saviour. ©

Spring has arrived, at least in this part of the country, with signs of spring everywhere! Some of the plants are starting to put out new growth, some are even blooming and even the grass is a little greener. I hope you noticed the flowers in bloom in the Memorial Garden? (Pictures below.) A good Samaritan planted those, and you all are welcome to do the same.



In fact, there are several planting areas along our entry area: (the garden along the walk, planting around the tree, the little area by the office door) and a bit of color looks wonderful. Just as a reminder: Did you know April 22 in Earth Day where we should do something nice for the Earth. All are welcome to stop and smell the flowers, and maybe pull a weed or two. With Palm Sunday and Easter arriving in a few short weeks, it would be nice to add some colorful flowers and mulch!

Facility and Grounds has been looking into projects that LCOS needs: the 4-ton A/C unit that cools the rooms across the front of the church hasn't worked or been needed in years, but with that large room becoming the only gathering/meeting space, we will need it cooler when the summer heat hits! The wood fence across the back of our property wasn't in the best of shape and Hurricane Milton finished it off. Ernie has removed all of it and it's now waiting for a trip to the dump. We have a chain link fence behind the wood fence, but it has taken a beating from our back neighbors who do not want to walk around Webb Road and have managed to completely crush our fence at the corners so they can just walk through, and they do because I was back there and 'spoke' to one that I watched walk through! Code Enforcement has been called regarding the huge pile of debris that was piled up against our fence. Our next item is painting the 4 buildings. That has been on our list for awhile, but other things came up that were more important at the time. However, there are a number of repairs that need to be done before we can paint; the base of the columns along the walkway is a major item.

Before Palm Sunday, or at least before Easter, we'd like to get the lights back in place over the altar. That requires a large articulating boom truck to reach over and up to those fixtures. The design of this building was never to include repairs, I guess! Just hope we have a much calmer/milder hurricane season this year. Milton had this building rocking!

Yes, this sounds like a lot of projects and hard work, but the reward is we are still here and thriving. It wasn't but a few years ago when we

had a For Sale sign in our front yard, to sell our back lot, thinking it was our only hope to continue here. God works in many ways, setting us on a new path, and here we are! Blessings to all who helped make LCOS continue its work in Town N' Country.

Kaye Prox Food Bank is 100% run by community volunteers. We host 3 distributions, serving over 300 families each week, on the campus of LCOS. We are a partner agency of Feeding Tampa Bay (FTB).

Mission Teams in 2024

At the beginning of 2024, our church council began to re-evaluate our mission teams and initiatives, using a questionnaire developed by Pastor Steve and Deacon Steve. The result was a published report, "2024 Priorities" which was published in a previous Newsletter article.

Ministry Areas in 2025

At its January 2025 meeting, our church council continued this work by adopting a new way of identifying our ministry efforts. We now recognize ten "ministry areas." More importantly, each council member has agreed to take a leadership role to encourage and maintain our key teams. A "ministry area" is simply a broad category of similar activities. Taken as a whole, the council believes that these ten ministry areas cover most of the work that is needed to accomplish our values and mission and the work God wishes us to accomplish at LCOS. Our mission and vision are listed on page two of this (and all) newsletter(s). These ten areas, the people taking ownership of these areas, and examples of key tasks within each area are listed in the table below:

Establishing Ministry Areas:

The first steps for most of these ministry areas have already been accomplished: Confirm definition of the ministry area (what is in and not in an area) Clarify what teams are already operating well

Next steps will be to clarify what teams need to be re-established or new teams need to be started. In this process, Ministry or team leads will be approaching congregation members to help, so please be open to more involvement.

Remember that our congregation most likely will not be able to afford a full-time pastor for a while and that the clock is busily ticking away on Pastor Steve's two-year commitment to us. As we continue with our part-time pastoral support, it is <u>we</u>, the congregation, who will have to pick up some tasks that a full-time pastor might normally do. Getting us organized to identify and keep our volunteer teams vibrant is almost a necessity!

Work in Process:

Ministry Area Leads are busy setting several key goals to accomplish in 2025. It's been encouraging to see our *care mission* accomplished by a small but very faithful *Lay Pastoral Care Team* reaching out to sick and shut in members of our congregation on a weekly basis and to enjoy regular *fellowship* coffee hour opportunities after worship each Sunday. Efforts are underway to re-establish our *greeter program*. The *Evangelism/Outreach* teams led by Sharon Rozell and Danielle Kearney are looking at a wonderful event to invite the community to join LCOS for an Easter Egg hunt the week before Easter, following up with an invitation to join the congregation for Easter Sunday worship.

Food Bank leader Kristi Thiese is looking for more volunteer help in this growing ministry centered on the LCOS campus.

There is growing participation in **worship planning** and leadership and in the choir. If you feel the desire to volunteer as a reader or worship assistant, please contract either Gail Smeach or Music Director Naoko Okada. We currently need crucifers, acolytes and banner bearers (perfect jobs for our young people). The role of **ushers** is being updated.

Behind the scenes, volunteers are collaborating with Deacon Steve, Kent Chetlain, Heidi Richters, and John Major to improve our *use of technology* on Sunday mornings and during the week. New Sunday morning projection volunteers are needed. Kristi Thiese is leading *Social Media* ministry. The technology team is moving closer to implementing non-profit MS Office on all PCs purchased last year. The *technology* team has produced the first draft of a Basic IT Training course for LCOS Volunteers and is reaching out to our vendor to address our on-going audio issues.

Future Steps:

We are looking forward to a *Ministry Fair* in the fall. Following worship, our ministry leaders and teams will be available in Luther Hall to share their work and invite new volunteers to join them. God is working among us at LCOS in new and exciting ways! Leadership is inspired and reaching out to share their enthusiasm with others. Please actively support our church council as they identify, implement, and support these ten ministry areas! When asked, please say yes and join our growing number of volunteers sharing their faith in word and deed!

BARBARA BEAUREGARD organizes and orders the Christmas Poinsettias and Easter Lillies. I take care of the Floral Arrangements and any Special designs.


Outreach Ministry

Car Seats



WHY "ASH" WEDNESDAY? Submitted by Karen Urban

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent - a 40-day period of prayer and self-examination in preparation for Jesus' death on the cross for us, the undeserving.

Ashes are usually made by burning the palms from the previous Palm Sunday and mixing with oil. Since the 11th century, the ashes have been placed on the forehead in the shape of a cross with the words from Genesis 3:19 "you are dust and to dust you shall return." This is to remind us of the shortness of human life and the need for reconciliation with God.
